




Appendix II - Proposed conservation area boundary for Peasemore






Appendix V: Historic landscape character types

1. View from public vantage points at Beedon Common. Peasemore House is prominent.
2. Views of wooded centre of village and rooftops.
3. Views of church spire rising from tree cover from Hillgreen.
4. Views of village edge and church spire down pathway from Fox and Hounds PH frontage.
5. Views from hillside on Field Road to the church spire.
6. Glimpses of church spire in wooded setting from road to Stanmore.
7. View from Mud Lane to The Old Rectory flanked by woodland and trees.
8. Views from Mud Lane to the church spire and wooded village.
9. View from Village Street in the centre of the village to the church.
10. Long distance view out from eastern boundary towards The Rookery.
11. Middle distance view out from public footpath

1*	Gidley Farmhouse	II 25/10/51	RG20 8TX	39963	Farmhouse with 19 th century barns surviving within the setting of the listed building
2	Church of St Barnabas	II 27/06/72	RG20 7JF	39964	Church. Base of tower circa 1737, main body circa 1842, chancel circa 1866. Chancel by G. Street
3*	Drakes	II 02/12/86	RG20 7JF	39965	Formerly a farmhouse, now a cottage. Early 17 th century with 19 th century extension and 20 th century alterations.
4	The Old Rectory	II 02/12/86	RG20 7JF	39966	Former rectory, now a private house. Late 18 th century with 19 th century and 20 th century extensions and alterations.
5	Stable block 72 metres north of the Old Rectory	II 02/12/86	RG20 7JF	39967	Stable block. Early 19 th century.
6	Peasemore House	II 21/04/88	RG20 7JH	39968	House. Previously listed as Priors Farm House. The list address was amended 18/07/2006 to Peasemore House. Mid 19 th century.
7	Barn 30 metres west of Peasemore House	II 02/12/86	RG20 7JF	39969	Barn. The list address was amended from Barn 30 metres west of Priors Farm House to Barn 30 metres west of Peasemore House. Early 17 th century with later 17 th century aisles.
8	Granary at Widows Farm 36 metres south of barn at Peasemore House	II 02/12/86	RG20 7JF	39970	Granary. The list address was amended from Granary at Widows Farm 36 metres South of Barn at Priors Farm to Granary at Widows Farm 36 metres South of Barn at Peasemore House. Circa 18 th century.

9	Peasemore Manor (now known as Manor Farm)	II 21/04/88	RG20 7JF	39971	Hall house, now farmhouse. Early 15 th century, altered and extended late 18 th century; altered mid 20 th century.
10	Barn approximately 25 metres to south west of Princes Farmhouse	II 29/04/91	RG207JQ	39975	Barn. Late 18 th century.
11	Paxmere House	II 05/04/04	RG20 7JH	491233	House. Probably 17 th century, with additions and alterations of 18 th century and later. N.b. Recent BARG research suggests that Paxmere House may date to the 14 th or 15 th centuries. (BARG, 2008).


Appendix VIII: Other buildings of historic or architectural interest within the parish of Peasemore

Building no. (refer to map at Appendix VII)	Building name	Address	Notes
L1	Shed west of Peasemore House	Chieveley Road	Later 19 th century shed of eleven bays constructed using 'wycheit', an earth based building material composed principally of clay and small stones. A rare survival in West Berkshire
L2	Coach House Stables west of Peasemore House	Chieveley Road	Coach house and stables associated with Priors Farm House (now Peasemore House) forms the northern and eastern range of farm buildings. The range was constructed by 1840 and includes many original internal fixtures and fittings
L3	Stables at Manor Farm	Village Street	Earlier 19 th century red brick stables associated with Manor Farm.
L4	Barn at Manor Farm	Village Street	Timber framed barn with weatherboard cladding and thatched roofs probably dating to the 19 th century and associated with Manor Farm
L5	Princes Farmhouse	Princes Lane	House. Princes Farmhouse dates from the 19 th century and is the principal building for the group of agricultural buildings associated with the farm
L6	Princes Cottages	Princes Lane	A row of cottages constructed pre-1840 and associated with Princes Farm
L7	Princes Stables	Princes Lane	Stables constructed pre-1840 and associated with Princes Farm
L8	The Old School House	Princes Lane	School House constructed c. mid-19 th century
L9	Elm Tree Cottage	Chieveley Road	Thatched 19 th century cottage
L10	Bramble Cottage	Chieveley Road	Thatched cottage of unknown date (may date to as early as 15 th or 16 th centuries – BARG is due to undertake a survey of Bramble Cottage to determine the building's date)
L11	Old Post Office	Hailey Lane	Thatched 18 th century cottage,






