

## Helping your child take the lead

- Sometimes observing, waiting and listening are not enough and your child may need a little encouragement to initiate play and interactions.
- Some things to try:
  - Get down to their level. This will show that you are interested and ready to play.
  - Be face to face so that you can see each other's expressions. If eye contact is a challenge for your child then position yourself slightly to one side.



- Use facial expression (look expectant) and body language (lean forward) to show that you are waiting for them to start.
- Once your child starts to play, respond with interest and enthusiasm. Then
  pause and wait for them to respond again.
- · You may need to give your child a reason to communicate.
- Some things to try:
  - Offer a choice of toy. Present two options (you can use objects or pictures) and ask, for example, 'Do you want to play with the bricks or cars?' then wait. Accept a look, a gesture, or a vocal sound as a response. Remember those non-verbal communications!
  - Introduce something in a bag or box that your child will need help opening.
     Wait and see if they look to you or use a gesture or sound to seek your help.
  - Place something you know your child likes out of reach. Wait and see if they seek your help.
  - Offer things bit by bit, for example, one ball/marble at a time to roll down the run. Wait! Again accept a look, gesture or vocal sound to seek more.
  - Once your child initiates an interaction respond with interest and enthusiasm.
     Remember to give your child praise for, 'good asking', whatever means they use.
