To support communication and language development

What is Makaton?

- Makaton is a language programme using signs, symbols and speech to help people communicate.
- Speech is <u>always</u> used with signs, in spoken word order.
- Signs and symbols can help people who have no speech or whose speech is unclear.
- Makaton is also shown to support early communication skills such as attention, listening, taking turns and understanding.

Getting started

- The first aim is for your child to make a connection between the sign and what it represents.
- Introduce 3-4 signs to start with. These seem to be the most useful:

Drink





Eat





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More





Flat hand, palm down. Covers top

Wash hands





Some things to remember

- Your child will understand signs fairly quickly, but it will normally take much longer before they perform them.
- Be patient and don't get frustrated. This should be fun!
- Repetition is important. Use every opportunity to sign.
- Your child's first signs may differ from yours. Don't worry; the signs will develop over time, just like speech. So keep modelling the signs correctly.
- There may be some signs that your child will never make but will understand perfectly. This is quite normal.
- Try to extend signing to the whole family and carers. Show them the signs you are using.
- But most of all have fun ©
